
Explore McMaster, Your Way

#29. Student Recruitment Office: Togo Salmon Hall Room 111

This is your one-stop shop for information. Before or after your tour you can connect with a Recruitment Officer to get your admission and program-related questions answered.



#23, 38 & 29. Arts Quad Courtyard

The three identical buildings are connected via underground tunnels and are home to our Faculty of Humanities, Faculty of Social Sciences, and School of the Arts.



#46. DeGroote School of Business

Home to our undergraduate commerce programs and Experience Learning Office. The addition of the 10-storey McLean Centre for Collaborative Discovery will make this a premiere destination for students to discover, learn, and collaborate.




#54. David Braley Athletic Centre

Your one-stop-shop for all things athletics, including our Pulse Fitness Centre, a 200m indoor track, and volleyball, basketball, and squash courts.



#89. Peter George Centre for Living and Learning

The first three floors house classrooms, including our largest lecture halls, study spaces, an eatery, a coffee shop, and our Student Wellness Centre. Fourth floor and up are student residences.



#28. Commons Building

Out of 18+ eateries, Commons is home to one of our main dining halls, Centro. Feel free to head in and buy yourself a bite to eat!



#8. University Club in Faculty Hollow

Majority of the buildings in this area were built in 1930 when McMaster first moved to Hamilton. Nearby, on the North-West edge of campus, you will find a large, wooded ravine called Cootes Paradise filled with trails to explore. If you're lucky, you may even run into a deer or two!

#50. Mary E. Keyes Residence

Our suite style residence is located on the west side of campus, conveniently next to the GO Bus Station. Home to Bistro, a large, nut-free dining hall, Bistro-2-go and Tim Hortons, there are ample options for hot and cold grab and go items.




Home to our Faculty of Science, you will also find science labs, lecture halls, a Planetarium, and a coffee shop.

Interested in Residence?

Our 13 residence buildings are within a five to fifteen minute walk to classes, athletic facilities, libraries, and dining options. We offer a variety of room types, traditional/dormitory, apartment, and suite style residence.

#16. John Hodgins Engineering

Home to the Faculty of Engineering, classrooms and study spaces, there is also an express cafe. The Gerald Hatch Centre next door is a 28,000 foot innovation hub for over 5,000 Engineering students.

#37. Health Sciences Centre

Everything you need all in one place. Students can book small study spaces providing a quiet place to get work done. Here you will find lecture halls, a café, the Health Sciences Library and one fifth of Albert Einstein's brain!

#52. Michael DeGroote Centre for Learning and Discovery

If class is not in session, check out room 1305/1307 a 616-seat lecture hall, used for many first-year courses. There is also the waterfall atrium that offers a quiet, serene place to meet friends.

#74. L.R. Wilson Hall

This Liberal Arts building houses a stateof-the-art black box theatre, expansive lecture halls, active learning classrooms, soundproof music practice rooms and study spaces.

#10. Mills Memorial Library

Mills is our largest library on campus with the Writing and Academic Skills Hub on the second floor and Lyons New Media Centre on the fourth floor. As you move up each level becomes quieter until you reach silent study on the sixth floor.

#51. McMaster University Student Centre

Here you will find the La Piazza food court, several coffee shops, the Campus Bookstore, a nap lounge, the dentist, optometrist, Student Accessibility Services and the McMaster Students Union.

McMaster University was founded in 1887 in the City of Toronto by Senator William McMaster. In 1930, McMaster University relocated to the City of Hamilton, thanks to the community who raised funds to make the move possible.



McMaster's 300-acre main campus is nestled in the beautiful Westdale neighbourhood. Surrounded by conservation space at the western end of Lake Ontario, between Toronto and Niagara Falls, our self-contained, pedestrian friendly campus is a 15-minute walk end to end with ample green space and access to local trails.



With approximately 32,000+ full-time undergraduate students, McMaster is a mediumsized university with a close-knit community. Home to four libraries, an athletic complex, a nuclear research reactor, a planetarium, the McMaster Museum of Art and many Canadian and world-leading research laboratories.
